

SMC BRINGS RIVER CLEANUP PROGRAM TO CEBU TO HELP EASE FLOODING

San Miguel Corporation (SMC) launched its Butuanon River clean-up in Mandaue City, Cebu, expanding the company's long-running Better Rivers PH program in support of the government's Oplan Kontra Baha initiative.

The project will cover a four-kilometer section of the river from its mouth, where heavy siltation and waste buildup have restricted water flow to the Mactan Channel.

The Butuanon River was among the waterways that overflowed in November 2025 during Typhoon Tino, which brought more than a month's worth of rain and caused widespread flooding in Mandaue.

SMC Chairman



and CEO Ramon S. Ang said the company will undertake the cleanup at no cost to the government, following the flooding experienced by residents.

"Mandaue has long been home to San Miguel and to generations of our employees, and we are glad to support the government in this effort to help reduce flooding and protect communities," Ang said.

SMC, which operates several major facilities in

Mandaue, is implementing the project in partnership with the Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH), which leads Oplan Kontra Baha, and the Mandaue City government.

The project was launched at the Eco Learning Center inside the San Miguel Eco Park in Mandaue. Those in attendance included Mandaue Mayor Thadeo Jovito "Jonkie" Ouano, Rep. Emmarie Ouano-Dizon, DPWH Undersecretary Charles Calima, other officials of DPWH and the Mandaue City government, and representatives from the Department of Environment and Natural Resources. SMC was represented by Jimmy O. Lu, vice president and overall project manager of Better Rivers PH, San Miguel Brewery Inc. how many pages of the Bible I read each day. All God cared about was me. He wanted to know me, and in order to do that I had to talk to him and tell him what I was feeling and what I needed. It was that simple. Armed with this revelation, I returned to church with a shift in perspective: I was no longer there to fulfill some obligatory duty put forth by Catholic leadership, but to be with God and feel his presence in a peaceful place. Whatever your modus operandi is, do it. The stipulations of a religion are not worth following if doing so harms your relationship with your God. Give yourself the freedom to pursue your relationship, your way. When you do, I promise you will be filled with a deeper sense of faith and belief that goes beyond the teachings of any religion.

NUTRISYS PH STRENGTHENS DATA-DRIVEN NUTRITION PLANNING IN CALABARZON

CALAMBA CITY, Laguna — Local government units in CALABARZON are expected to strengthen nutrition program planning and accelerate efforts to reduce malnutrition with the deployment of NutriSys PH, a digital platform designed to improve the management, accessibility, and utilization of the nutrition data for evidence-based decision-making.

Developed through the collaboration of the National Nutrition Council (NNC) CALABARZON, the Department of Science and Technology (DOST) CALABARZON, and Colegio de San Juan de Letran Calamba, NutriSys PH serves as a centralized digital repository for nutrition-related records and documents required under the Monitoring and Evaluation of Local Level Plan Implementation Protocol (MELLPI Pro). The platform aims to streamline document submission, storage, and evaluation processes, making nutrition governance more efficient at both the local and regional levels.

Santa Rosa City, one of the local government units under the Department of Science and Technology's Smart and Sustainable Cities and Communities Program, was selected as the pilot deployment site for the project. The activity brought together representatives from the City Nutrition Office, members of the nutrition secretariat, and selected Barangay Nutrition Scholars (BNSs) who were trained on the platform's key features and functions.

Participants underwent system demonstrations, hands-on exercises, and guided discussions to familiarize them with the platform. The training equipped users with the skills needed to upload MELLPI Pro requirements, manage nutrition-related records, and maximize the system's capabilities in their day-to-day operations.

According to Regional Nutrition Program Coordinator Lourdes Bulante-Orongan, NutriSys PH is expected to significantly improve the way local governments manage nutrition in-

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DOST-LANDMARK PACT TO PILOT REGION'S FIRST AI-DRIVEN URBAN MOBILITY SYSTEM

In a steady effort to bring science-driven solutions to local governance, the Department of Science and Technology (DOST) - CALABARZON officially formalized its partnership with the City Government of Lipa on May 26, 2026. Through the signing of a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) at the New Lipa City Hall, the department is providing technical and financial support to implement the "AI-Powered Traffic Analytics and Decision Support System for Sustainable Mobility and Traffic Decongestion in the City of Lipa." This visionary project, funded under the Smart and Sustainable Communities (GIA-SSC) program, marks a historic milestone as the first of its kind to be piloted in the region.

At the heart of this initiative is SEERMO, an AI-powered urban mobility platform that acts as a governance mechanism rather than just a planning tool. Unlike traditional methods that focus solely on vehicle counts, SEERMO utilizes computer vision to count people and analyze movement patterns, prioritizing people-centric urban design. This highly scalable technology enables the city to produce comprehensive studies, such as road safety assessments, in just two days rather than the tradi-



tional six months, ensuring that policy decisions are grounded in real-time evidence rather than outdated manual observations.

The project is strategically designed to produce measurable impacts on the daily lives of Lipenios, with a target to reduce peak-hour travel times along major roads by 15 to 20 percent. By integrating fragmented data across mobility, land use, and tourism, the city can now justify sustainable interventions that reinforce public trust and climate resilience. Key objectives of the partnership include:

- Data-Driven Route Planning: Updating the city's Local Public Transport Route Plan (LPTRP) using daily license plate data to align public services with actual commuter origin-destination patterns.
- Integrated Urban Analytics: Mapping informal

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• Public Safety Innovation: Merging geo-tagged disaster risk reports from the DRRMO with AI-driven analytics to rapidly identify and address road crash hotspots.

This partnership signifies a major shift toward institutionalizing a culture of science-driven governance that endures beyond short political cycles. By building internal technical capacity through DOST-Batangas, the department is empowering Lipa City to manage its urban growth with transparency, cost-effectiveness, and scientific precision.

Emphasizing the regional significance of this historic agreement, Ms. Emelita P. Bagsit, DOST-CALABARZON Re-

gional Director shared her vision for the future of the province and the region: "This initiative positions Lipa City as a pilot benchmark for the implementation of SEERMO in CALABARZON, highlighting how AI-driven and data-supported governance can improve planning, policy-making, and service delivery. Through this partnership, DOST aims to demonstrate how local technologies can help LGUs address challenges such as traffic management through science-based and data-driven decision-making, paving the way for replication across other SSC-partner LGUs in the region."

Under the two-agreement, DOST-CALABARZON will provide ongoing technical oversight to ensure that scientific results are translated into maximum economic and social benefits.

Universal health care expansion drives higher PhilHealth support; highlights need for long-term sustainability

policy experts, development partners, and healthcare leaders underscored the need for sustainable financing, institutional resilience, and long-term policy commitment to secure the future of Universal Health Care (UHC) in the Philippines during a Health Forum held at the Healthway Cancer care Hospital on June 11.

Philippines Health Insurance Corporation (PhilHealth), the Philippine Institute for Development Studies (PIDS), and the Private Sector Advisory Council (PSAC) to examine the progress of UHC implementation and the challenges that must be addressed to ensure its continued success.

Participants noted that the UHC Law has significantly expanded healthcare access for millions of Filipinos, strengthening financial protection and bringing essential health services closer to communities. However, speakers emphasized that sustaining these gains will require responsive financing mechanisms, prudent fiscal management, and continued investments in healthcare infrastructure and workforce development.

Dr. Edwin M. Mwecado, President of PhilHealth, highlighted hallmark reforms and improved service delivery as mandated by the UHC Law. He stressed that healthcare investments should be viewed not merely as expenditures but as investments in national development.

"This irreversible shift in our baseline of support UHC Law - immediate eligibility from the and expanded benefit packages. Now our strategies must shift towards smarter spending through tailor-fit interventions to maximize the value of every peso spent for Filipinos. Meanwhile, Dr. Valeria Gilbert Ulep of PIDS emphasized the importance of ensuring

that healthcare expansion is supported by sound fiscal planning and evidence-based policymaking. He noted that maintaining public trust in the healthcare system depends on balancing broader access with long-term financial sustainability.

PSAC Health Sector Lead and Ayala Corporation Chief Social Infrastructure Officer, Paolo Borromeo, highlighted the importance of sustained public-private collaboration, innovative approaches to healthcare financing, and institutional partnerships in supporting Universal Health Care.

"Universal Health Care is a shared commitment that extends beyond any single institution. Sustaining the momentum we have started requires strong partnerships across government, healthcare providers, industry, and the private sector. As healthcare needs continue to evolve, our collective challenge is not only to expand access, but also to build resilient and sustainable systems that can continue serving future generations of Filipinos," Borromeo said.

Throughout the discussion, speakers agreed that healthcare is both a social imperative and an economic investment. A healthier population contributes to a more productive workforce, stronger communities, and greater national competitiveness. The session also explored the role of government, healthcare providers, and development institutions in building a resilient healthcare system capable of meeting the evolving needs of Filipinos while remaining financially sustainable.

The health forum forms part of broader efforts to foster informed dialogue on the future of healthcare financing and delivery in the Philippines, reinforcing the shared commitment to achieving better health outcomes for every Filipino. PR

EDITORIAL: Safer cities

EARLY this month, the Department of the Interior and Local Government announced stricter implementation of the ban on alcohol and gambling in public areas under its Safer Cities program.

Interior Secretary Jonvic Remulla said the program will initially be piloted in Metro Manila before expanding to other major urban centers nationwide.

Acting on the DILG order, the Philippine National Police (PNP) reported that more than 48,000 violators were apprehended during the first three days of the program in Metro Manila.

Of this total, some 7,389 violators were fined, 403 were charged, while 15,584 were warned and released.

Drinking and smoking in public places were the most common violations with 7,300 apprehensions.

This was followed by individuals outside their homes without shirts, curfew violations involving minors, and videoke or karaoke beyond allowed hours.

According to PNP Chief Police General Jose Melencio Nartatez Jr.: "Let's follow simple rules, avoid violations, and respect others. Small things are a big help in ensuring public order."

But the Safer Cities project should be evaluated not only in terms of the number of people apprehended for various violations but also across several policy dimensions: effectiveness, legality, governance, fiscal sustainability, and civil liberties.

First of all, what problems will the project hope to solve? Will it target street crime, drug-related offenses, terror threats, or urban disorder? Or maybe all of the above?

The project implementation should rely on evidence such as crime data and urban risk mapping.

It should be aligned with clearly defined and empirically validated risks rather than broad, vague goals like "peace and order" without measurable targets.

Most Safer Cities programs in other countries involve such tools as expanded CCTV surveillance, increased police visibility, 'smart' technologies as facial recognition, and community policing.

But these tools must be proven to reduce crime. Heavy reliance on surveillance, for instance, can produce a perception of safety without addressing root causes like poverty or weak prosecution systems.

The DILG must work closely with various local government units (LGUs), so implementation quality will vary. Do LGUs have the technical capacity to operate and maintain surveillance systems? Are accountability mechanisms clearly defined? After all, a structurally sound policy can still fail if local execution is weak.

We must also point out the legal and civil liberties implications. The program should comply with the Data Privacy Act of 2012 and uphold civil liberties guaranteed by our fundamental law.

The DILG's Safer Cities project should be considered positive if it is evidence-based, has clear accountability mechanisms, and avoids over-reliance on surveillance as a substitute for systemic reform. However, it becomes problematic if it centralizes surveillance without oversight, burdens LGUs without capacity support, and prioritizes visibility over actual crime reduction.

What is important is to maintain the balance between public order and civil liberties at all times.



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PhilHealthon YAKAP Provider Accreditation in Region 4A

This is to provide context to the reports regarding the accreditation of healthcare facilities under the jurisdiction of PhilHealth Regional Office IV-A (PRO IV-A).

The participation of providers under PRO IVA continues to grow. The number of facilities engaged in the program exceeds the small number that have stepped away. This year alone, 24 new facilities have been accredited, bringing the total number of YAKAP Clinics in PRO IVA to 298. In addition, nine facilities currently have pending applications and are completing accreditation requirements.

The reasons for disengagement are varied and the single case that cited non-payment was resolved following the provider's compliance with system related issues. The involved facilities each had distinct circumstances that led to their disengagement, most are rooted to their capacity to adhere to YAKAP's accreditation requirements.

PhilHealth continues to pay valid claims; complete and compliant claims are processed and paid accordingly. While we recognize that a novel program of this scale will encounter challenges as it expands, PhilHealth has established its system that resulted in a 98.74% payment rate for SAP1 nationwide. In the region, payment is at 96.29% amounting to Php 122 million paid to YAKAP facilities as of June 8, 2026.

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CHED Approves Doctor of Medicine Programs for Five State Universities, Expanding Medical Education Nationwide

QUEZON CITY, PHILIPPINES — The Philippines has long struggled with a severe shortage of medical practitioners—the country's physician-to-population ratio stands at a critical 7.92 per 10,000 people, falling short of the international minimum standard of 10 per 10,000 recommended by the World Health Organization (WHO).

In line with the directive of President Ferdinand R. Marcos, Jr. to expand the country's medical and nursing education programs to increase the number of healthcare professionals, the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) has approved the applications of five State Universities and Colleges (SUCs) to operate the first and second-year levels of their respective Doctor of Medicine programs, effective Academic Year (AY) 2026-2027.

Following a thorough evaluation and deliberation by the CHED Office of Programs and Standards Development (OPSD) and the Technical Panel for Medicine, the following state universities were found fully compliant with CHED's minimum requirements under CHED Memorandum Order (CMO) No. 18, series of 2016 on Policies, Standards, and Guidelines for the Doctor of Medicine (M.D.) Program:

Visayas State University (VSU) – Region VIII

Eastern Samar State University (ESSU) – Region VIII
University of Eastern Philippines (UEP) – Region VIII

Benguet State University (BSU) – Cordillera Administrative Region (CAR)



Cotabato State University - Cotabato Regional Medical Center School of Medicine (CCSU-CRMC) – Region XII

This milestone initiative aligns with the government's broader mandate under the Doktor para sa Bayan Act, aiming to address the shortage of medical doctors in the Philippines by providing accessible, high-quality medical education across various regions—particularly in underserved areas like Samar, Leyte, the Cordilleras, and Central Mindanao. Benguet State University is the first SUC in Cordillera Administrative Region with a medical program. With these new approvals, the administration has successfully established at least one SUC with a medicine program in every region nationwide, with the exception of the newly created Negros Island Region (NIR), which is poised to be the next priority.

By expanding medical program offerings in state-funded institutions, CHED ensures that aspiring and deserving doctors from diverse regions can pursue their medical dreams locally, ultimately strengthening the country's healthcare system and community-based health service delivery.

Mayor Davey Chua and Vice Mayor Dino Chua personally handed over the donation for the local police station.

In a statement, Chua underscored the municipal government's commitment to aid the Noveleta
